NEWS OF THE DAY

Effort to End Strike
 Chicago, Oct. 18.—Telegrams summoning the chiefs of the "big four" brotherhoods and switchmen's union to a conference with the United States railroad labor board in an endeavor to forestall an actual walkout on the nation's railroads, were dispatched to labor chiefs today.

All of the members of the board are in the city except the three public members who have been in conference with President Harding and the Interstate commerce commission at Washington. The latter will reach Chicago late today.

Prisoners Burn Quarters
 Cork, Ireland, Oct. 18.—The work of destruction begun Sunday by the occupants of the Spike Island camp for interned prisoners when they became enraged because they were not permitted to attend mass, it is alleged, was continued today, the cheering of the prisoners as they carried on their operations being plainly heard in Queenstown.

Announces Delegates
 London, Oct. 18.—Mr. Lloyd-George, the prime minister, stated in the house of commons upon the amendments and Far Eastern problems as he hoped to go to the Washington conference on the limitation of armaments and Far Eastern problems as soon as the parliamentary and general situation rendered it possible.

The other members of the British empire delegation, the premier said, would be A. J. Balfour and Lord Lee of Fareham, first lord of the admiralty, Sir Auckland Geddes, the British ambassador at Washington, would act as a delegate. Mr. Lloyd-George added, in the absence of the premier or any other delegate.

Wants Treaty Passed.
 Washington, Oct. 18.—Re-establishment of peace with Germany as necessary for American and world rehabilitation was the fundamental reason given in the senate today by Senator Hitchcock of Nebraska, ranking democratic member and former chairman of the foreign relations committee for favoring ratification of the peace treaty with Germany.

"The question before us now," said Senator Hitchcock, "is not a choice between the Versailles treaty and the pending treaty, but between the pending treaty and a protracted uncertainty without any treaty."

Johnson Favors Treaty
 Washington, Oct. 18.—With a vote on ratification of the German peace treaty expected today, Senator Johnson, republican, California, an "irreconcilable" in the Versailles treaty fight opened the day's discussion in the senate with a statement explaining his position in favor of ratification.

Senator Johnson said he could not subscribe to the views of other "irreconcilables" that the treaty would be likely to involve this country in European entanglements, although recognizing the sincerity of those holding that view.

FORMER UNI STUDENT IS CAMPUS VISITOR

Mr. Elmer Johnson, who graduated from the college of pharmacy in 1918 was a campus visitor Tuesday. After his graduation Mr. Johnson went directly into the service and for two years was in charge of the pharmacy department at Fort Riley, Kansas, where dispensatory service was rendered to two hospitals caring for nearly six thousand men. Because of Mr. Johnson's efficiency he was detained long after the war had ended and the camp nearly abandoned. Since his discharge for the army he has been in the drug business at West Point, Nebr.
