### STATE BOARD ATTENDS PHARMACEUTICAL MEET

The second meeting of the Nebraska branch of the American Pharmaceutical association was held Tuesday evening in pharmacy hall. The meeting was of special interest inasmuch the state examining board for licensing practitioners of pharmacy was present. An exceptionally large number of students were present.
