

DINNER FOR MEN IN ARTS COLLEGE

A. & S. Students Make Effort to Arouse Spirit and Effect Organization.

For the purpose of developing a "college consciousness" and promoting spirit among students, the men of the college of arts and sciences will hold a dinner at the chamber of commerce Wednesday night, December 14.

Approximately three hundred tickets will be validated for the affair and are going on sale today on the campus. All men in the college are urged to secure tickets early and attend this first gathering of its nature of arts and science students. The tickets will sell for 75 cents. An excellent dinner will be served by the chamber of commerce caterers.

Dean P. M. Buck will preside over a short toast list after the dinner. Short addresses will be made by one or two faculty members and students. Other novel entertainment features have been secured and the dinner promises to be a great success.

A committee consisting of Dean Buck, Ward M. Randol, Orvin B. Gaston, and Mike Miles have been at work for some time making plans for the affair. The necessity for organization within the college of arts and science, which is the largest college in the university, has long been apparent. It is thought that bringing the men of the college together in this manner will be an excellent beginning toward such organization.

A similar affair for the women in the college will probably be held some time in the future.

CONSULAR COURSE WILL BE OFFERED

Dean Buck Arranging Plans to Give Work Regarding Government Service.

Courses designed to prepare students for the consular service of the United States are to be offered in the University of Nebraska in the near future, according to an announcement by Dean Philip M. Buck of the arts and science college. Courses in the diplomatic service will also be given and students can prepare to enter the government service without much of the preliminary "red tape" now required. The courses are so designed that students will be able to pass with little difficulty, the examinations required of candidates for the service.

The consular service is charged with the duty of protecting the interests of the government and of American citizens abroad and with extending and protecting American trade in foreign countries. Unlike the diplomatic service which is the agency through which one government communicates with another in the conduct of international affairs and which deals with the central governments of foreign nations, the consular service deals with local authorities and individuals.

A consular officer has definite portion of a foreign country assigned to him and finds his sphere of action within this territory. The diplomatic officer on the other hand has the entire country to which he is assigned, in which to work. Because of this, the consular officer is brought into more direct contact with commerce through the duties assigned him than in the case of the diplomatic officer.

Officers Are Graded. There are various grades of consular officers. Each grade, except that of student interpreters and consular agents, embraces several classes of officers. In addition to the commissioned consular officers, the personnel of the service includes a large number of clerks and subordinate employees. Consular officers are stationed throughout the world in places

of political or commercial importance.

The functions of the consular officer are classed under (a) protection of the interests of his countrymen and (b) facilitation of trade.

Applicants for consular positions must be between the ages of 21 and 50 years. They must be citizens of the United States. They must be of good character and must be physically and mentally qualified for the proper performance of consular work. They must have been specially designed by the president of the United States for appointment to the consular service subject to examination.

Examined on Many Subjects. Examinations for the consular service are divided under eight subjects. These are international, commercial and maritime law; political and commercial geography; arithmetic; modern language; natural industrial and commercial resources and commerce of the United States; political economy; American history, government and institutions; modern history (since 1850) of Europe, South America and the far east.

An examination for candidates for the corps of consuls for economic investigational work includes four subjects. These are research and investigational methods for promotion of commerce; economics; thesis; modern languages.

The compensation of consular officers are graded and classified as follows:

Florence Miller, who led vesper services at Ellen Smith hall Tuesday evening, spoke of the need of remembering the students in Europe who are suffering from want. She also brought out the fact that the distance separating them from us should not lessen our sympathy and interest in them.

The vesper choir furnished the special music for the services. Miss Wilson, the traveling secretary for the Presbyterian board, explained the purpose of Christian institutions and especially that of the Y. W. C. A. She showed how the Y. W. C. A. is a pioneer for the work of welfare for women. She is interested in the way girl's live and spend their time.

In the same way that the Y. W. C. A. helps girls, the church aids the family. The beliefs of the Christian faith are more tangibly expressed by good deeds of service. She told of the many expressions of the spirit of
