There will be no more annual team contests for the team championship, Instead the western lintercollegiate has instituted a percentage system whereby each team - holding four matches in the association is eligible to the championship. The first six meets in the association are all that will count in championship awards. This places the minimum number at four and the maximum at six in awarding the title.

The individual competition will be limited hereafter for the championship. The four leaders in the association in each weight will be selected on the basis of their number of wins and losses and will attend the annual meet to decide who is champion. This will limit each championship contestant to two bouts.

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
