SENIORS FILE FOR IVY DAY ORATOR

Politics at the University of Nebraska have started simmering and are each moment moving toward what proves to be a boiling point. The all university ticket announced Thursday has created a stir among the campus politicians who are now waiting to see what other candidates will file.

But two new candidates had announced themselves up to Thursday evening. Kenneth McCandless and Chauncey Woodle have filed for Ivy day orator. A meeting was recently held at which time there was to have been the selection of a middle-western opponent to be invited to meet the California team on University day, April 15.
