ture to stores which supply fifteen million people. In Denmark there is the same tendency to co-operate and do away with the middle men. Denmark is going up the scale constantly with nine-tenths of her farms owned by the farmers themselves. America is going down the scale. Some day we will learn that brotherhood is better than strife and will hasten to adjust our bad conditions.

Mr. Eddy scored Wm. Randolph Hearst for his yellow journalism and his going out for private property no matter at what cost to the public. He praised Herbert Hoover who is one million dollars poorer since his benevolent work of feeding the starving Belgians. He is measured in his value as a man not by property but by service.

"The days of kaiserism and plutocracy are numbered," announced Mr. Eddy. "We must apply the principle of liberty to our industrial problems. You are going out to live either the spiritual or the material life."

"Are you going to be a pagan or a Christian? A materialist or a spiritualist?"
