ANNUAL ART EXHIBIT IS HERE NEXT WEEK

Industrial Collection Already Being Placed in Campus Gallery—Opens Monday.

The annual art exhibition at the University of Nebraska will open on Monday, February 20. The industrial art exhibit which comes to Nebraska from Dayton, O., has already arrived and is being placed.

The collection of pictures will include two exhibitions one of which is from the American Federation of Arts in which the leading artists of America are represented.

In the second collection there are also a large number of distinguished names including Wayman Adams, O. E. Berninghaus, Fred Carpenter, Irma Cohn, Carl Krafft, John Noble, William Wendt and Dudley Crafts Watson.

Contrary to the custom of the past, the exhibition this year will be free. This is the first time that the art association has adopted such a policy.

A large enrollment in the drawing classes prohibits the exhibition from being open to the public from 1 to 6 in the afternoons. It will be open from 9 to 1 every morning, and from 6 to 1 in the evenings, at which times the public is cordially invited.
