



The plan of such a system is simple of any college or university. Examinations are written in examination books which have a pledge printed on the inside cover which may or may not be signed as the individual wishes. If an individual is found 20, at the American Legion Club cheating in an exemaination, his case is dealt with by Honor Commission. which is elected by the student body, and a punishment is decided upon and carried out with the aid of the faculty.

At the University of Chicago before the honor system was adopted, there were so many cases of cheating reported that the faculty was at a loss what to do for they didn't have time ced to deal fairly with the individuals implicated. After the institution of the system only a few rases of dishonor were found and rarely has any one had to be expelled.

After all honor is more or less of a habit, and the university is the best place in which to cultivate good habits.


