Professor F. M. Fling adressed the freshmen Monday afternoon and Tuesday morning, taking for his subject the Washington Disarmament conference. ### LARGE AMOUNT FOR **EUROPEAN STUDENTS**

Nebraska University for Relief Work.

The University of Nebraska did so well in subscribing to the student relief fund for European students that the University of Illinois sent for information so they could put on a similarly successful drive this week. the Herbert Hoover fund handling European Student Relief and with the European Student Relief and with the pledges the amount will total between \$3200 and \$3300.

In Russia and Germany the money will be used to provide the absolute necessities of life without which the student population must be arbitrarily reduced. Since 1914 one-third of the medical men in Russia have died as a result of war and pestilence. The country needs men educated to take their places. To live in Moscow and not go hungry is worth 40,000 rubles monthly (a ruble normally is worth 50 cents). Such is the terribly condition that ten or more students in Russia alone, starve daily. Our friendly aid will encourage, inspire and reenergize the very life of students over there.
