

TENNIS COURTS WILL BE OPENED SATURDAY

Nebraska Expects to Enter Team in Missouri Valley Race This Year.

With the coming of Spring, Tennis has taken on a new importance. The tennis enthusiasts are impatient to get at their playing and they will not long be denied as two men have already been secured by the athletic department and the courts are being put in shape as fast as they dry out. The men started work on the courts yesterday and it is thought that at least three of the courts will be in shape

for playing Saturday, good weather prevailing.

This year Nebraska expects to enter into tennis competition of the Missouri Valley and matches are now being arranged for the tennis team. It is hoped to have several dual meets and if there is promising material for Valley championships men will be sent to the Missouri Valley Meet which is to be held at the University of Kansas. Negotiations are now under way for meets with the Kansas State Agricultural College, University of Oklahoma, Creighton University, and it is hoped to add several others to this list.

All candidates for the Varsity team are asked to get out as soon as possible so that the best men of the University may be encouraged and that they might practice as much as possible before the first meet. The basket ball floor at the coliseum has been marked out for one double court and the men who were out for tennis last fall and showed up the best will be encouraged to go out there and practice. This court was marked out yesterday and is now ready for playing. Arrangements are being made so that the building will be open so players may practice at any time but due to the fact that there is only one court only those men who showed ability will be allowed to use this floor, as it is expected that it will be busy most of the time.

Skalberg, Limjoco, Russell, Crawford, Colby, Peddicord, and Matthews, were the men who composed the team last fall and it is hoped these men will begin practice at once. It is thought that Nebraska, with these men and some others who without doubt have tennis ability should make a good record in any dual meet and place some men in the Missouri Valley.

George Salter is acting manager of the tennis team and is cooperating with the athletic department in arranging matches and taking care of the tennis courts. All holders of season tickets are eligible to use the courts while students who do not have the season ticket may play on payment of a small fee. Memberships

may also be secured for the balance of the school year.
