WILL MAKE SURVEY OF DISABLED VETS

WILL BE FIRST WORLD CENSUS IN INTEREST OF SICK AND INJURED

Every Country That Took Part in the War Will Receive Statistics

New Orleans, La.—The first world survey of the present condition of the sick and wounded men of the world war is to be compiled at the fourth national convention of the American Legion at New Orleans this fall. This survey will combine the reports of the Interallied Veterans' Federation with the reports of the Geneva conference held in March under the auspices of the International Labor Office.

The Interallied Veterans' Federation is made up of the veterans' associations of all the nations allied in the world war. The International Labor Office, in which the United States is not officially represented, was created under the terms of the Treaty of Versailles and includes fifty-four nations in its personnel at present. It is financed by the League of Nations.

At the conference of this body in Geneva representation was accorded to Germany and Austria as well as to the ex-service men of the allied nations. This was practically the first occasion on which the soldiers who faced each other on the field have met in conference for the solution of their common problems, and it was hailed in Europe as an event of great significance.

The reports of this organization together with those of the Interallied Veterans' Federation, which includes the American Legion, will make up the first complete summary of what the civilized world is doing for the disabled veterans. The results of the survey will be made available at once in all the countries that took part in the war.
