Individual competition will be awarded the three cups donated by Colonel Mitchell for this purpose. Each cup will be suitably engraved.

Following this, the final parade of the year will be held on the drill field north of Social Science Building. At this parade, the sponsors will be presented to their respective organizations by the officers and will address a few words to them. The officers

will take leave of their men at this time and the companies will break ranks for the summer.

The program for this year's "Compet" has been carefully worked out by the officers in charge and the time scheduled has been so arranged that allowing for all possible delays it will be over for the afternoon at 5 p. m. This will be made possible by overlapping the events and carrying on company drill, inspection and individual drill for the companies simultaneously.

**Finale of the Year**

But the grand and hilarious finale of the military year will start at 7 p. m. this evening, when the men will assemble in front of Nebraska Hall to form for the annual Company "Q," or shirt-tail parade through streets of the business section of Lincoln. Every man is expected to attend in appropriate costume and prizes in the form of treats are offered by the cadet officers for the most striking "get-ups." The parade is handled by the Cadet Officers Club and is traditionally headed by the winner of the individual compet and by the winning company. It furnishes a happy let-down from the afternoon of rigid discipline that the men have gone through. The parade follows a previously determined line of march and the men are received by the business places through which they pass in a cordial manner.

Drinks and smokes are usually provided by the drug stores and candy shops visited. The men are bound to respect the property of the places which they visit and all harmless hilarity will be unchecked. The parade will end in front of Nebraska Hall where it began, unless otherwise specified and the traditional bonfire will be lighted on the parade ground, around which a "pep" session will be held. The tired and happy bunch will say their final goodbyes here at the close of another school year for the department. The memories which one carries away from these gatherings are invaluable in after years and sorry is the man who leaves the university without having attended at least one "shirt-tail parade." He has lost his part in one of Nebraska's most cherished traditions.

 tary department. All cadets are required to learn the principles of shooting and to fire the prescribed course. This feature of the military instruction is very helpful, practical and en-

teresting. Some mathematical and mechanical principles are taught. "Changing the elevation 100 yards at any range will give a change on the target, in inches, equal to the square of the range (expressed in hundreds of yards.)" Numbers of cadets are proudly wearing qualification badges for their good shooting at camp, and it is expected that many more will qualify on the range at Ft. Snelling, Minn., at the summer camp this year.

**Gallery Range Competitions**

Some of the very interesting gallery range competitions follow:

The inter-company gallery match held Dec. 12-20, 1921, was one by Co. I at that time.

The inter-fraternity gallery match held Jan. 23-28, 1922, was won by Delta Chi.

The Nebraska R. O. T. C. had four teams in the 7th Corps Area gallery matches, which was more teams than any other university or college within this corps area. The first team was captained by Capt. A Junior Unit gallery match between the University of Nebraska and A. & M. College of South Dakota, was fired February 27-28, 1922, and won by Nebraska, score: 3306 to 3270.

The Senior Unit of Nebraska fired several matches with other universities, among them was the one against Senior Unit of University of North Dakota, fired Feb. 8-9, 1922, and won by Nebraska with a score of 1792 to 1791.
