Students May Vote at the Primaries If They Register Before July 8

Ladies and gentlemen—yes, you can all vote now. How many of you know that the primaries are due July 18? How many know you can vote, yes, even here in Lincoln unless you make the trip home to cast your ballot. Here is the dope.

First, as a resident of the capitol city, go to the city hall and register. You are a resident of Lincoln if you are making this your home while you are in school.

This registration proclaims you as one member of the party with which you affiliate, republican, democrat, socialist, progressive, prohibitionist, or anything else. The registration must take place at least ten days before July 18. That is after July 8 you cannot register.

Every American citizen of proper age and mentality should vote. Other-

wise, if congress or the legislature or the governor or some other official dissatisfies you its about up to you to "forever hold your peace." You, not they, have failed to perform your duty as an American citizen.

Now with your name printed on the ledgers of the city hall you are ready to cast your ballot on July 18. There you nominate the candidates for the various offices. In November the various candidates nominated at the July primaries will clash in the final analysis of public favor. Get into the free-for-all in July and do so by registering at once in order that you may vote. If Lincoln is your present residence and you are "on your own" go down and talk it over with the official in charge of the registration at the city hall, the city clerk. Register now and be able to vote.
