DEMING PREPARES CHEMISTRY BOOKS

Professor Writes Series of Three Texts For Use in Science Class Rooms

Professor H. G. Deming of the chemistry department of the University of Nebraska has prepared three books on chemistry. The books are "General Chemistry," "Chemical Fundamentals" and "A Laboratory Manual of General Chemistry."

"General Chemistry' is now in the hands of the publishers. It will be issued about October 1.* It contains about 750 pages giving a general elementary introduction to chemistry, with an emphasis to industrial applications. It is said to be one of the best illustrated books in chemistry on the market.

"Chemical Fundamentals" is a smaller text. The manuscript for this books has just been completed. It will serve as an easy introduction to physical chemistry.

"A Laboratory Manual of General Chemistry" is a smaller book which accompanies the first volume. It was prepared in collaboration with A. B. Arenson of the department of chemistry and has been in use in mimeographed form in the freshman classes of the university for two years.


