Plans Being Completed for State-Wide Drive for Funds in November

## MITCHELL WILL LEAVE THE ARMY

Colonel of University R. O. T. C. Will Retire September 30th

At his own request, Colonel Americus Mitchell, commandant of the University of Nebraska R. O. T. C., will be retired from the United States army September 30, according to notice re ceived from the U.S. war department by the university.

Colonel Mitchell came to the University of Nebraska in August, 1921, from the Infantry School of camp Denning, Ga. During his year's stay here, he has made friends of all the h. O. T. C. cadets and of the members of the university faculty.

After leaving Nebraska the colonel will go to his home in Alabama with his mother and son.

#### 32 Years of Service

Colonel Mitchell has been in military service for more than thirty-two years. He was born in Alabama ia December, 1870. When a senior in the A. and M. college of Alabama he was appointed to West Point in 1895. He was with the fifth infantry of the regular United States army until 1899 when he was detailed to recruiting

Two years later he was sent to the Philippine Island where he remained a year and a half, returning to the United States to be instructor in modmilitary school.
