Meeting the Situation.

The University continues to grow. Reports on enrollment show an increase this year. Classes in many departments are unusually large.

The increased enrollment and the demands for certain instruction have taxed the teaching force in some departments to the utmost. Instructors are meeting the increase in the size of their classes in the best way possible.

In cases where the classes were too large for any satisfactory instruction many adjustments were made. This caused inconvenience for a number of students. 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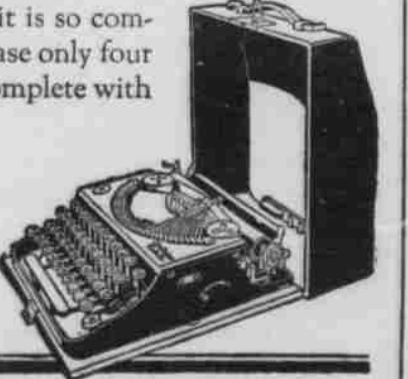
