

UNIVERSITY PUBLICITY

Prof. R. A. Braun, in charge of official testing at the University College of Agriculture, visited the School of Agriculture at Curtis, last week, to confer with Supt. C. K. Morse on the official testing done at that station.

The Nebraska School of Agriculture at Curtis had eleven purebred cows, Shorthorns and Holsteins, entered in the Southwest Nebraska district fair. Anna Topsy, state champion cow of her age, took the grand champion prize and the others took seven first, three second, and two third prizes. Supt. W. P. Snyder of the North Platte Experimental station was the judge.

The opening meeting for the year of the Nebraska section of the American Chemical Society will be held October 17, in the main lecture room of Chemistry hall. The speakers will be Dr. M. J. Blish, professor of agricultural chemistry of the experiment station and Dr. H. G. Deming, professor of chemistry. The officers of the society are arranging an attractive series of programs for the year.

Dean Harry L. Thompson, College of Pharmacy, University of Utah, visited the college on his way back from the convention of the American Pharmaceutical Faculties at Cleveland, Ohio. He has the degrees of B. Sc. and Master of Pharmacy at the University of Nebraska.

A testing program, which measures students with educational and mental tests, is being conducted by the Nebraska Bureau of Educational Research under the direction of Dr. Charles Fordyce, professor of educational measurement and research. This is part of the national movement to improve the schools by stimulating local activity. It is recommended that the test program be under the direction of some member of the teaching staff who has had training in educational and mental measurements.

Dean Clyde Davis Has Completed Book

Dean Clyde Davis of the Dental College has nearly completed a book he is writing on the subject of "The Dental Pulp and Pulp Canal." This work is being done for the publishers of the "Dental Items of Interest" and will first run serially in that publication. Later a first bound edition of 10,000 copies will be issued.

Dean Davis is considered a national authority on the subject and the book will be a complete report of the research work done with Dr. Weight of the Pathological Laboratory, which was finished in June of 1921.

was \$107 each. At that the total was subscribed in one-half a day. Nebraska's average is the lowest of any in the entire country where memorials are being erected. Holtz then read the letter from John Corleyou, an alumnus, criticizing as much too small, the plans for the Stadium as announced.

Dawson Praises Spirit

Fred T. Dawson, dean of men, told of the better spirit which is being manifested on the Nebraska campus this year. He praised the conduct at the last Saturday game. He told of the spirit with which the football squad worked, and he said, "That is the spirit with which this committee must go into this job. You must grit your teeth and to after it hard. You must not allow defeat to enter your head. You all think this is the thing to do. Now you must visualize the rest. You must make yourself so 'sold on the proposition' you won't take 'no' for an answer.

"The football team cannot extend itself in the present quarters. The freshmen have to use the military field whenever they are lucky enough to get the use of it. We haven't enough equipment for good practice. We bump into the fences in getting down under passes. We can only have one scrimmage going on at a time when we should have at least three.

The new Memorial Stadium will have two football fields, an indoor track extending all the way about, indoor tennis and handball courts. It will have wonderful equipment.

Old subscriptions taken two years ago will not be held in this campaign if the subscribers desire that they be not held. It is hoped that all of them will at least equal the minimum unit of \$25.

Campaign Opens Monday

The campaign opens Monday, October 16. On that day students will be allowed to give voluntary pledges. Letters with pledge blanks enclosed will be mailed to all students this week and Monday there will be turns in at a big booth to be erected on the campus.

The names of all the students making pledges and the number of units they pledged will be printed in the Nebraskan as possibly in the city papers.

A \$5 deposit will be made on each pledge made. The rest will be paid in six months installment of \$5 per unit each. They may be paid sooner if the pledger wishes.
