WARRIORS DEPART TONIGHT FOR HOME OF JAYHAWKERS

Husker Grid Squad to Start for Kansas Camp Thursday Evening

TO DEDICATE THE STADIUM

K. U. Freshmen to Take on Husker Frca at the Time of the Game

The Nebraska grid squad, headed by Coach Fred Dawson and his assistants, will leave tonight at 10:30 or Lawrence, where the Huskers will work out on Friday, preparatory for the big game with the Jayhawk aggregation the next day in the huge stadium which has been recently completed.

A hard-fought contest, in which the odds slightly favor Nebraska is the prospect for Saturday's game with the Jayhawkers at Lawrence, Kansas is expected to make a supreme effort to dedicate her new stadium with a victory and to put a crimp in the Valley championship plans of the Huskers. Kansas will be able to present her strongest lineup with the exception of an injured guard, Davidson, who will not be able to start the battle, while Dawson will pit his strongest team against the Jayhawkers.

The disappointment to the Nebraska coaches and players furnished by the Syracuse defeat is expected to act as a spur which will result in a more savage attack against the Kansas than has been displayed by the Scarlet and Cream machine this season. Coach Dawson and his assistants have been driving the men hard this week in the scrimmage with the yearlings, and new fire and fighting spirit is being developed by the Varsity.

No Postseason Game.

All chances for a post-season game with Iowa or any other team were practically eliminated by the Syracuse defeat, according to the latest word given out at the Athletic office. Dawson declares that Nebraska will have her hands full in completing the rest of her schedule without a defeat, and has no post-season game will be considered now that the Huskers lost to the Orange eleven.

Coach Patsy Clark of Kansas is putting his men through a series of strenuous workouts this week in preparation for the invasion of the pow-

erful Cornhusker machine on Saturday. The Kansas team, which started the season auspiciously by holding the Army to a 13 to 0 score, and then slumped, losing to the Drake Bulldogs, and tying the Kansas Aggies. However, last week the Jayhawkers showed signs of coming back by defeating the Sooners 19 to 3. The Kansas took new spirit when they learned of the outcome of the Syracuse fray last Saturday, which showed that the Nebraska team was not unbeatable, and they may be expected to fight the Huskers to the last ditch on Saturday.

If Nebraska wins its remaining valley games, its title to the conference title may still be questioned by Drake University of Des Moines. The Bulldogs have not lost a game this season, and has defeated three Valley schools, including Kansas. It is disappointing to note that Nebraska will not meet the Drake team, and the relative strength of the two teams will have to be judged on the basis of comparative scores, which at their best are but a poor index of a team's strength.

The playing of the yearling candidates has taken on a noticeable improvement this week, as but the eighteen Fresh gridsters who make the best showing will be taken on the trip to the Kansas game.

Husker harriers leave today for the Missouri Valley Conference meet to be held at St. Louis this coming Saturday. The men representing the school are Capt. Bowman, Hyde, Hartman, Higgins, Haskell and Gardner. This is the same team that lost at the Ames meet with the exception of Bowman and Hyde who replace Rogern and Cook.

This meet will be of much interest as it determines the championship of the valley. The prospects, at the present time, look good for fine weather, and if the team runs under no handicaps a good showing is to be expected.

Nebraska's success in this minor sport this year has not been phenomenal. Three meets have been held, and Nebraska has not achieved any special honors in any of them. "It's not because the men we have are not good," said Coach McMasters, "but the fact that there are not more men out to give them competition, which would make them better."

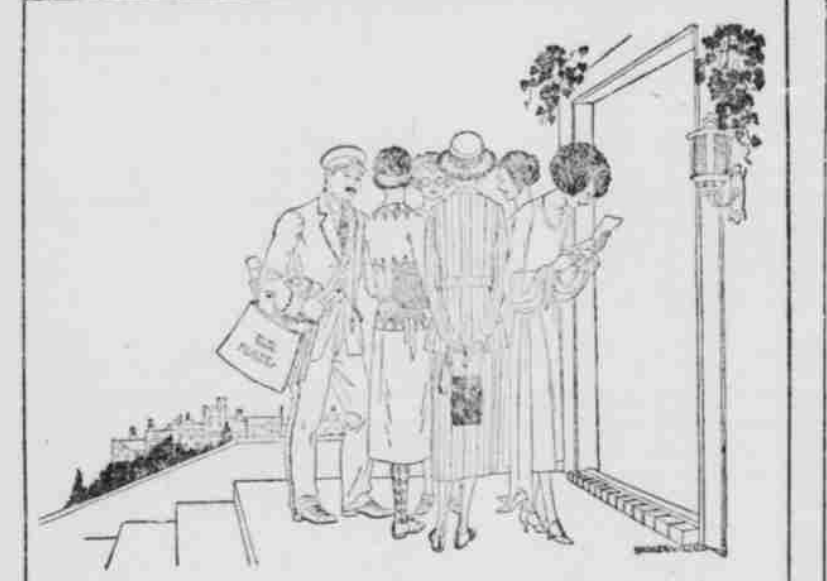
