student committee, to make application for such membership in the particular church of his choice, then to present himself according to the regulations of that church, at the Sunday morning service to be received. In some of the churches a certificate of membership is presented to those who unite as affiliate members. It is not enough for the student merely to state to a committee the church of his choice—he should also present himself at the church for the service of reception on Sunday morning, which in practically all cases will be quite simple and very impressive.

Co-operation has been the key-note of the campaign for student church attendance. The six student pastors, the two Christian Association secretaries, and the members of the various committees have been very active in the work. The University, represented by Chancellor Samuel Avery, directed the mailing of invitations to 5,000 students.

All the churches of Lincoln have committees working on the campaign, and a partial list of these was printed in the Nebraskaan. It is to be emphasized that an affiliate membership does not change the connection of the student with the home-town church. It exists only during the student's stay in Lincoln and automatically ceases when the student leaves town.

Attention of Catholic students is called to the all-student communion at 9 o'clock which will be followed by a breakfast in the cathedral basement. The affiliation program is under the direction of the Catholic student club.

## COUNTY CHAIRMEN TO BE GUESTS AT GAME

Stadium Drive in the State is Progressing Rapidly—Ends Saturday Evening

Nebraska's campaign for a stadium will end Saturday night, November 25. Monday morning, November 27, at 8 o'clock, the alumni office will give out a report to all county chairmen of the amount of the quota which has been subscribed in each county. All county chairmen are to see the Notre Dame game in Lincoln, Thanksgiving day, as guests of the athletic association.

A successful campaign, on the whole, among alumni in the state, is indicated by the reports sent to the alumni office by the county chairmen. A number of counties have oversubscribed their quotas, many have not yet completed their campaign but are confident of reaching the mark set, and a very few predict failure. The reports follow:

Burt County—It looks to me as if Burt county quota will be taken care of within the next four or five days. W. M. Hopewell.

Chase County—We expect to go over the top. F. A. Snicker.

Deuel County—Received no subscriptions so far. Cannot leave work to solicit in person. Mailed explanatory letters asking subscriptions to all alumni in county. Will probably get some money but cannot finish this week. Quota \$200.00. F. S. Copeland.

Dixon County—No progress being made. Have seen nearly all in Ponca. No luck. Cannot even get helper for work outside of Ponca. Quota \$475. I. A. Mellon.

Gage County—Gage county still working. Subscriptions now total \$1,500. Clyde B. Dempster.

Hall County—Slow progress. R. D. Kingsberry.

Hayes County—Twenty-five dollars pledged. Reported by mail today. Carl J. Wolford.

Holt County—Have \$105 pledged in Holt county. John Golden.

Howard County—Campaign got started late but is now progressing nicely. Expect to make quota. R. A. Haggart.

Nuckolls County—Nelson and Nora quotas are raised. Superior, Hardy, and Bostwick are at work. W. A. McHenry.

Otoe County—Nebraska City has already more than subscribed its quota of \$700. I feel sure that Otoe county will do its share. W. W. Wilson.

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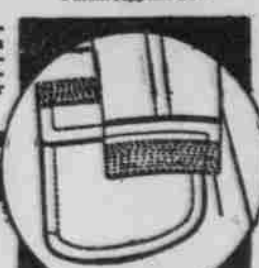
