HUSKER GRAD IS CAPTAIN OF PRO GRID CHAMPIONS

Guy Chamberlain, Famous End on Former Nebraska Team, Is Pilot of Bulldogs

THREE HUSKERS ON TEAM

Ed. Shaw, Roy Lyman and Guy Chamberlain Play on Ohio Professional Team

The championship professional football team of the United States, the Canton Bulldogs, has been piloted this season to victory by Guy Chamberlain, recognized as Nebraska's greatest football player and the one star who was individually responsible for Nebraska's victory over Notre Dame in 1915. Chamberlain is manager, coach, and end for the Bulldogs and has starred in their continuous string of victories this year. Roy Lyman, who was an outstanding star at left tackle for the Scarlet and Cream last year, is playing on Chamberlain's eleven. Ed Shaw, captain of the Cornhusker gridsters in 1917, is another member of the Bull Dog aggregation. Chamberlain has been playing professional football for a number of years and his performance has been a source of continual favorable comment.

Minnesota to Play Ames.

The Gopher athletic authorities have announced that they have scheduled a game with the Ames Aggies in 1923. When Coach Spaulding was questioned concerning a Nebraska-Minnesota clash, he declared that the Minnesotans have all the hard games they can handle next season.

Wisconsin followed the same course in scheduling one of her games. She declared that Nebraska, Creighton, South Dakota, Ames Aggies and Marquette are being considered for one of the preliminary games. She continued, however, to say that Creighton or South Dakota will probably be given the contest. Evidently Wisconsin also appreciates the prowess of the Huskers on the gridiron.

According to late press dispatches, the Penn State athletic authorities have asked that the Cornhuskers play them in the new Yankee Stadium in New York in 1923. This would be playing on a field foreign to both schools, which is against the Valley

Conference rules. Also, the Cornhuskers are now in a position to ask the big teams to play them at home, due to the building of the new stadium and the strength of the Cornhusker machines each year.

CLASS MATMEN TO MEET AT FOUR O'CLOCK

Bout Will Last But Eight Minutes Instead of the Customary Twelve

ALL WRESTLERS ELIGIBLE

All Men Taking Wrestling Will Be Required to Take Part in This Meet

A class wrestling meet will start today at 4 o'clock in the Armory. This is the first meet of the season. All wrestlers of the University are eligible, that is, all freshmen and Varsity men are allowed to compete. The weights will be the regular standard ones used in the dual meets, and there will be a two-pound allowance in each class. This two-pound allowance does not hold good, however, in the annual championship meet. The bouts will be cut to eight minutes instead of the regular twelve, and there will be two-minute extra periods instead of three. The same advantage will be required, however, as if the regular time were being followed. This advantage is that a man to win in an eight-minute bout must have an advantage of one minute, and if he takes extra time, he must have an advantage of thirty seconds in the two-minute bout.

The men will be allowed to weigh in at the regular time, which will be not earlier than 12 o'clock tomorrow, and if they are not down to weight then they must be down by 4'. All members of the wrestling class, which totals some sixty-odd men, are required to take part in this meet. Others may enter too.

Mr. Long of the College Book Store has donated medals for first places in each of these classes as he did last year. No numerals are to be awarded in this meet, primarily because it is open to all men including the Varsity wrestlers. A regular inter-class meet will be held later and at that time numerals will be awarded to the winners. In this meet, all the regular Varsity team will be barred.

At the first rounds of this meet will not be finished today, so from 4 o'clock on the rest of the days in this week and up to the time of the finish will be open for bouts.

This meet will be the first tested tryout of men for the team. While all men are eligible to compete, it will be used to get a line on the men who are the more prominent candidates for the team.

A change has also been made in one of the dates on the basketball schedule for this season, that with Drake University on January 16 has been changed to January 18. The complete schedule now is:

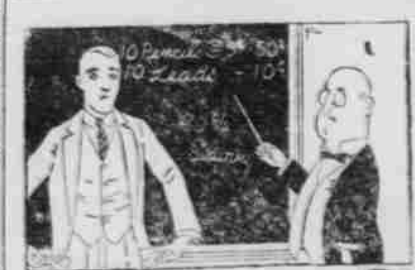
