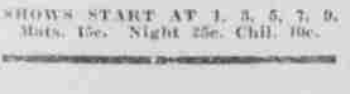

"Cornhusker Athletics" is accorded four pages, photographs of the Notre Dame game, and likenesses of the football captains, past and future, and their coaches. Coach Schulte is given complete approbation and praised for his work with the line and in track.

Interest in the activities of the students is shown by the alumni generally. In fact, nearly all events of the year of importance, such as "Dads Day" and the Cornhusker banquet, are commented on.
