

FEDERAL POSITIONS OPEN TO STUDENTS

Examinations for Positions Paying Three to Five Thousand Dollars to Be Held.

Civil service examinations are to be held soon, in about twenty subjects, which should be of particular interest to University students, according to civil service bulletins. Many of these positions carry with them, salaries of about three to five thousand dollars.

Seven positions at the Edgewood Arsenal, Md., are open to students successfully passing the examinations. They are as follows: Electrical engineer, mechanical engineer, assistant mechanical engineer and assistant electrical engineer. The higher of these positions carry beginning salaries of \$3,000 to \$5,000.

Other positions of interest to engineers are in the field service at Washington, D. C., and with the department of agriculture. These positions are: Valuation engineer, income tax unit, associate valuation engineer, assistant aeronautical engineer, junior engineer, bureau of standards, and highway engineer. The beginning salaries for these positions vary, one being as low as \$1,200. Their average is about \$2,500.

Three positions are open at the Rock Island Arsenal in Illinois. They are those of junior mechanical drafts-

man, assistant mechanical draftsman and associate mechanical draftsman. Beginning salaries vary from \$1,400 to \$2,400.

The technical and professional positions, which students might be able to obtain by taking the required examinations, are as follows: Computer, coast and geodetic survey, junior pathological technician, army medical museum, assistant agricultural economist, bureau of agriculture, library assistant, departmental service, and junior economist, section of statistics, treasury department.

And so Professor Floyd has made brass tubes, flutelike in length; he has made brass imitations of the clarinet, made flasks without necks and necks for flasks. He has made a violin that is not a violin. He has even made the producer of the human voice. The vocal bands are there. The "Adam's Apple" is there. The collection is an unusual one. And Professor Floyd is keenly alive to the new subject.—Kansas State Collegian.
