TRYOUTS HELD FOR CALIFORNIA AND M. V. MEETS

Coach Schulte Has Fifty Athletes Out for Tryouts for California and Missouri Valley Meets.

CRITES WINS QUARTER

Good Time Made in All Events Considering the Weather and Track.

A few tryouts for the California and the Missouri Valley indoor meets.

were held yesterday afternoon on the boards, despite the cold weather and flying snow. The time in the events was slow, but about fifty athletes took part in the tryouts. Five tracksters from the Omaha Medical school were down for the tryouts. Another tryout will be held Tuesday if the weather permits.

In the two-mile, Ted Clemmens, Omaha Med. C. finished first in ten minutes, thirty-five seconds. Zimmerman was second, Wier third, Hartman fourth. Crochus, Lear, Layton and H. Gish each won one heat in the 50-yard low hurdles. The time in each heat was 6.4. The first heat in the high hurdles was won by Creffius in fast 7:2. Lewellen won the second heat in the high hurdles in 7:1, defeating Lear, the Omaha Med. C.

In the quarter Crites sprung a sur-

prise when he took first place in the quarter-mile. Ted Smith was second, Tressler third, and Woodard fourth. None of the men exerted themselves in this event, as they were handicapped badly by the wind. Allen, Meade star, ran the mile in 4:51.

One-fourth of the Wyoming Legislature is composed of former Nebraska students or graduates, according to a letter from Frank E. Long, 16, Buffalo, Wyo., to Harold F. Holz, secretary of the University of Nebraska Alumni Association. Mr. Long recommends the organization a branch of the alumni association in Wyoming. He is president of the Wyoming board of sheep commissioners, which is composed of three men actively engaged in sheep-raising, appointed by the governor. The board is charged with the duty of examining all sheep coming into and going out of the state. It also takes charge of diseased sheep and supervises the treatment of them, and makes rules and regulations for bettering sanitary conditions in the industry.

Roscoe Pound, '88, Ph. D.
