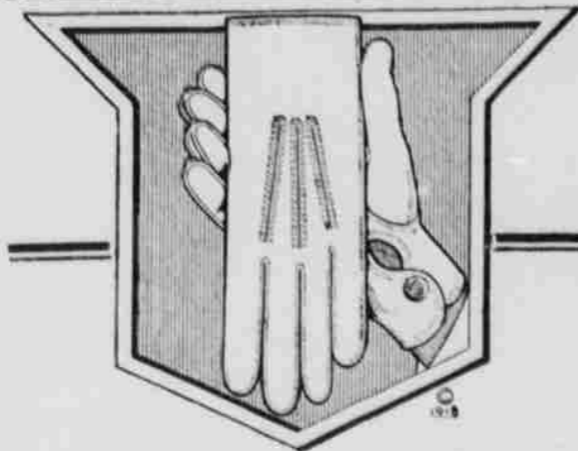

where suitable connections are available. Speech and music are picked up by a microphone much like the ones used in telephone work. When voice or music is transmitted from the library the pulsations are amplified greatly before being put into the transmitter.

At present the broadcasting hours are 7:00 p. m. on Monday and Thursday when lectures and readings are given from the station by faculty members or students, and 8:00 p. m. on Thursday when musical programs are given and a lecture presented. The musical programs are arranged by Professor Grumann of the School of Fine Arts. The weather forecast

and Nebraska road reports are broadcast daily at 10:00 a. m.

There are two receiving sets used in the station. One is a standard De Forest three-circuit, honeycomb set with detector and two stages of audio frequency amplification, and covers the wave length range from 180 to 20,000 meters. The other is a three-tube Inverse-Reflex set having four stages of amplification, using a loop antenna, and covering only the broadcasting wave bands from about 300 to 500 meters. A Western Electric type 10-A power amplifier and loud speaker are arranged so they can be used in connection with either set. Under favorable conditions these sets will pick up broadcast programs from most of the larger stations in the United States and Canada.
