

In the freshman year the departent instructors symtematically begin heir task of becoming closely acmainted with the new student. A personal knowledge of the man enables the instructor to call into play good qualities apparent in the individual and to begin the elimination of his weakness. Then by the end of the sophomore year recommendations are made to the commandant, of those the are considered eligible as candilidates for commissions. Recommendations are based on the student's meneral intelligence, his interest, leadership, energy, amencibility to disipline. physique, bearing, adaptation, elf-reliance, judgment and tact. The instructor must answer affirmatively the question, "Would I want this man as an officer in my own organization?" Finally, to be eligible for advanced work, or for promotion after beginning this, he must be making good in all his University courses. 





member of the winning company is presented with a blue ribbon. Each member of the second best company is presented with a red ribbon and the members of the third best company receive white ribbons. The members of the winning company are permitted to wear a special ribbon on their uniform as long as they are members of the Corps. This ribbon corresponds to the service ribbons worn in the army and is of scarlet silk with a norizontal stripe of cream. Immediately after a company has completed its drill in the company competition it is taken over by another set of judges and an individual drill or "spell down" is held to determine the best ten per cent in the company. The best ten per cetn in each company is then entered in an individual drill to determine the most proficient cadet in the manual of arms and school of the soldier. Individual loving cups are presented tto the first, second and third best cadets.

'The interest in the "Compet" is unusually keen this year as all of the companies have been working hard in preparation for the War Department inspection and all are in first class shape. The program will start with a review of the regiment by Chancellor Avery and Major Ericson, followed by the inspection and competitive company drill. The individual competitive drill will be held immediately after the company drill. sors. The program will close with a inal parade and the regiment will pass in review before the sponsore and the officers who are graduating from the Corps of Cadets this year. The afternoon on which the "Compet" will be held will be a half holiday and every student should be present to cheer his favorite company and to assist in the proper observance





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
