Chancellor Avery gave the principal address of the morning. He emphasized the importance of study and keeping reasonable hours.

"Your time is very valuable. It costs the state money, and it costs your parents a great deal more. But most of all, it is important to you because of the influence of the time said the chancellor.

"I am not a believer in the burning of much midnight oil. It is much better to study in the morning, according to my estimation. About PREDICTS THOUSANDS three hours study on each hour carried in the University ought to be enough," he continued.

"Do not neglect social contact beyond reason. You must remember that one of the greatest benefits of a university is the acquaintances

"As for Sunday, it should primarily be a day of rest. I would advise sleeping an hour or two more than usual. Another excellent thing to do is to go to church. Do not try to do too much pioneering in religious matters for a year or two," continued the chancellor.

"Try to make this section of the United States outstanding in the world because of its university. You are the class that can do it," concluded Chancellor Avery.
