VARSITY TRY AERIAL PLAYS ON FRESHMEN

Squad Reduced to Forty-five Men—Seventy Out at Start of Year.

The freshmen had the hard end of practice yesterday. For more than an hour they were used on defensive, while the varsity tried out their newest combinations in forward passing. There were only five regular first team men on the freshman squad. This made it an easy afternoon for the varsity who completed passes readily.

The squad has been weeded down to forty-five men as compared to the seventy or more that started the season. Most of the men who dropped out were light. Some of the fellows had difficulty in arranging their schedules for afternoon practice and had to quit for that reason.

The practices thus far have developed several men of outstanding ability. Weir at left guard is a worry to any opposing man on the varsity, and he has brought down words of praise from the varsity coaches. He is only of medium weight but in this one position where a man with a lot of fight is needed, he fits to a "T." The Manderey brothers, Roy at right end, and Avarid in the backfield have been showing first team form from the beginning of the season. They are good at the receiving end of a forward pass, and Avarid in the backfield is a ground gainer of no mean ability.

The freshmen have a quarterback in Bill Bronson who can size up the opposing team, and who has done some pretty passing work. He and Manderey make a pair which is sure of connecting over half the passes they attempt.

Some heavy men on the line include Jones, right guard, who tops the scales at 195, Bass right tackle 190, Gray 200. If a line were picked on the basis of weight alone, the freshman could have one averaging over 190 pounds to the man.

Freshman Coach Farley Young is making changes in lineup almost every day, and it is likely that the first team at the end of the season will be quite different from that at present. Right now in the scrimmages the second team shows up fully as well as the first team, and men are swapped from one team to the other frequently.

The Jayhawks are preparing for the annual battle with the Cornhuskers with renewed zeal. Coach Patsy Clark says his team is in the best shape it has been all season and they are coming up here to give Nebraska a real battle. He says his team hasn't had a chance to show its strength this year because both previous games have been played in the mud. He has some trick plays up his sleeve that he is planning on trying against the Scarlet and Cream. He said, "a dry field will help materially, because we can open up and try our real strength."

In the College World

James E. Watson, United States senator from Indiana, has been secured to speak at convocation at the state university Wednesday morning. Senator Watson has become famous internationally in the last few years since his election to the senate in 1916.
