Football makes its last stand of the year in the Missouri Valley Thursday afternoon when six conference contests are carded. The final award of the mythical championship laurels will be dished out following the Turkey day mixes between Nebraska and the Kansas Aggies, and Kansas and Missouri.

The Huskers and the Jayhawks have held the titular knot together for two weeks, since neither eleven came into action against Valley combinations last Saturday. From past performances, all points towards a conference finish resembling that of the Big-Ten—an undecided tie. And justly so far as scores are concerned, for the Huskers and the Kansans played full time several weeks ago to a scoreless knot.

Aggies Nose Out Oklahoma
Last week one of the best exhibitions of the season was handed near 10,000 enthusiasts at Manhattan when the Kansas Aggies nosed out the Oklahoma Indians by a merry 21 to 20 count. The Aggies have uncorked a different brand of ball during the past few weeks, and so has Oklahoma. Both teams exhibited a fast baloon brand of the fall past-time last week end and the southern farmers are expected to surprise Nebraska unless the local artists are on their good behavior.

Grinnell, suffering from several coats of whitewash, spilled things on Iowa State on the latter's play grounds Saturday when the Iowans cooled the easterners after a tough battle 13 to 6. Neither team gets into Valley compet Thursday.

Huskers Meet Tough Foe
Of the grid assignments this week, the Cornhuskers, suffering from casualties of recent tussels, seem to have the toughest gift. The Aggies are known to have a shifty outfit and may come northward to demonstrate their rights to more than a tie for second place in the per cent column. Last week they exhibited a strong aerial combination which may prove fatal to the Huskers for the first time this season in the Valley.

Should Kansas fall before Missouri at Lawrence Thanksgiving day and dope run true to form, Nebraska will once more hold the Missouri Valley gonfalon. The outcome of the Drake-Oklahoma contest will have no bearing on the flag, although the Indians will have a chance to test the "surprise of the season" team on southern soil.

At present Kansas holds a single game lead over Nebraska, having met and defeated one more conference eleven than the Huskers. Both teams are on even terms however, having clean slates, and two knotted results. Should one of the two drop their only remaining twist, to the other will go the spoils, and a conference title.

SATURDAY'S GAMES END BIG TEN SEASON

Many Eastern Aggregations Also Wind Up Schedules; Among Them Syracuse.

Saturday's games rang down the curtain for many of the best football teams in the country. All the Big Ten teams played their last game of the season as did many of the eastern aggregations.

Chief among last Saturday's game was that between Syracuse, representing the best of the east, and Nebraska, representative of the west. Although in a crippled condition the Cornhuskers actually showed a superior line to that of their foes. Nebraska, in losing to the Orange team, played a great game, and their 7 to 0 defeat was at the hands of a worthy opponent. The Nebraska game closed the Syracuse schedule. The Orange expect to have a strong team next year although many of the most valuable men will be graduated. Following the Nebraska game, Syracuse squad elected Simmons, quarterback, captain for 1924.

In the Missouri Valley contests only three teams were in action. Besides Nebraska, Ames, playing Grinnell, won 13 to 6, and the Kansas Aggies in a game played Friday had hard work winning from Oklahoma 21 to 20.

Illinois and Michigan Tied.
In the Big Ten conference, Illinois won from Ohio State, 9 to 0. The Buckeyes always put up a stiff scrap against the Illini and Saturday's game was no exception. Once Ohio State had the ball on Illinois one-foot line but where unable to score in three downs. Not until the fourth quarter did State weaken and permit Grange, Illinois star half, to go over for a touchdown.

Michigan also came through undefeated, taking a 10 to 0 victory over Minnesota. Martineau and Kipke, rival captains, both playing their last game at halfback, were the individual stars of the game, repeatedly bringing the spectators to their feet with brilliant runs and smashes.

In another Big Ten contest Iowa was given the time of her life in winning from Northwestern 17 to 14. The game was closely contested thru-out and did not show the Iowans to be of their old-time calibre. Indiana won from Purdue 3 to 0. Chicago won from Wisconsin 13 to 6 in one of

the hardest fought battles in the Big Ten circles this year.

In the south, Centre vanquished Washington and Lee 19 to 0. Alabama beat Georgia 36 to 0, and Florida U. tied with Mississippi A. & M. 13 to 13.

In the east Yale won a decisive victory over Harvard 13 to 0, on a rain-soaked field. Last Saturday's game leaves Yale undefeated and a claimant of the eastern title. Another great battle was the Army-Navy game at New York, resulting in a scoreless tie. Notre Dame defeated Carnegie Tech 26 to 0, running the ends and hitting the line for consistent gains. Lafayette defeated Leigh 13 to 3, and Brown won from Boston U 27 to 0.
