These youngsters, ten and twelve years old, created quite a sensation when they won the Nebraska state championship at the state fair and then won third in competition with thirteen other champion teams from the cornbelt states at the Interstate

Fair at Sioux City, Ia. They defeated many older and more experienced demonstrators and were the youngest contestants in both contests. Their demonstration is one showing the practicability of the hog lot sanitation project of the agricultural extension service as they used it in their own pig club work this last year. They show why sanitation is

necessary in raising hogs free from diseases and base all their arguments on their own practical experience. House construction, care of the sow and pigs, and feeding are also taken up in the demonstration.
