 IN VALLEY MEET**

**Missouri Tracksters Place First  
 in Indoor Tourney With  
 38 Points.**

**WINNING SCORE  
 IS NEW RECORD**

Missouri won the third annual Missouri Valley indoor track meet held at Convention hall, Kansas City, Saturday night, when they smashed two Valley records, and registered a total of 38 points. Nebraska took second place with 24 1-2 points.

Pittinger, Missouri captain, broke the record of 4:29 minutes in the mile run when he covered the twelve laps in 4:28 2-10. This record was held by Allen of Nebraska.

Keeble, sophomore flash from Missouri, who recently broke the world record in the 50-yard high hurdles, broke the Valley indoor record in the fast time of 6 5-10 seconds. Weir of Nebraska was only two and one-half inches behind Keeble at the finish.

In winning the meet Missouri took five first places besides several second, third and fourth positions. Nebraska won only one first position but placed in almost every event. Kansas, winners of the indoor meet for the last two years had to be content with third position, and only 17 points. Oklahoma was unable to score a point.

In the mile relay races the Kansas-Nebraska race featured; Kansas winning by a narrow margin. The Missouri-Kansas Aggie relay time was only 4 seconds behind the fast 3 minutes 29 7-10 seconds of the Husker-Jayhawk race.

Husker rifle shooters carried their colors high last week. Northwestern university was defeated with a 354 point advantage, and Oklahoma A. and M. lost by 183 points. Iowa State reporting from the week before was outfired 456 points. Another late return from the week before brought news of a defeat by 9 points at the hands of North Dakota university. The Husker total for last week was 3750, and for the week before 3781.

The three victories and the defeat change the season record to 21 victories and 5 defeats. Returns have not yet been received from Coe college, Fairmont college, and Colorado School of Mines.
