

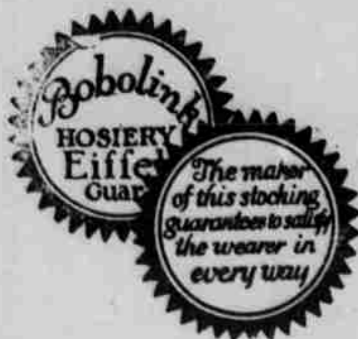
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**To Discuss Modern Chemical Warfare**

The Lancaster County Association of the Reserve Officers will hear series of talks on chemical warfare and ordinance, Wednesday evening at the Grand hotel.

Chancellor Avery, formerly a major in the Chemical Warfare Service stationed at Washington, will give some important information concerning the warfare service in relation to other branches of service. Major L. W. Chase, former professor of engineering at the University of Nebraska, will speak on special work of the ordinance department.

Prof. C. J. Frankforter, lieutenant-colonel of infantry of the Officers Reserve, and former officer in the Chemical Warfare Service, will speak on the manufacture of toxic acid. Prof. Frankforter saw the Edgewood Arsenal grow from a Maryland farm to a poison gas factory that at the time of the armistice was making more poison gas daily than England, France and Germany, combined.

A dinner at 6:30 will precede the meeting which is open to the public and all students or former officers and enlisted men.

**May Decide With Post-season Game**

University of Oklahoma, Mar. 17. —(By M. V. I. N. S.)—The Universities of Texas and Oklahoma will decide the caging championship of the southwest in a post-season game if authorities of the two conferences, of which the two schools are members, approve of the staging of the contest. The Longhorn Steers issued a challenge to the Sooner quintet which was promptly accepted by Ben G. Owen, mentor of Oklahoma, on condition that the Missouri Valley conference give its consent to the playing of the post-season game.

The Longhorns have just finished an all-victorious season and not only reign supreme in caging circles in their own little empire but also in the southwestern conference. The Sooners finished second in the Valley conference and hold the Oklahoma title by defeating Oklahoma A. and M. in two games.
