FIELDERS AND MIDDLE DISTANCERS EXCELL

Telegraphic Meet Features
440 Dash, Half Mile Run,
Jumps and Shots.

Middle distance men and field performers shone best in the freshman telegraphic meet held yesterday afternoon on stadium field. Dailey ran the 440-yard dash in the fast time of 52.6, and Mandery followed him close with 52.8. Houdersheldt ran the half mile in 2:09.5. Lyons high jumped 5 feet 81-2 inches, and Triba broad-jumped 20 feet and 1-4 inch. Anderson put the shot 36 feet 9 inches for first place in the shot-put.

The results of the events were telegraphed last evening to Kansas City where the results from other schools in the Valley will be compiled and the winners announced later.

Cold weather with a brisk north wind slowed down the track events considerably. In some of the events several contestants failed to show up.

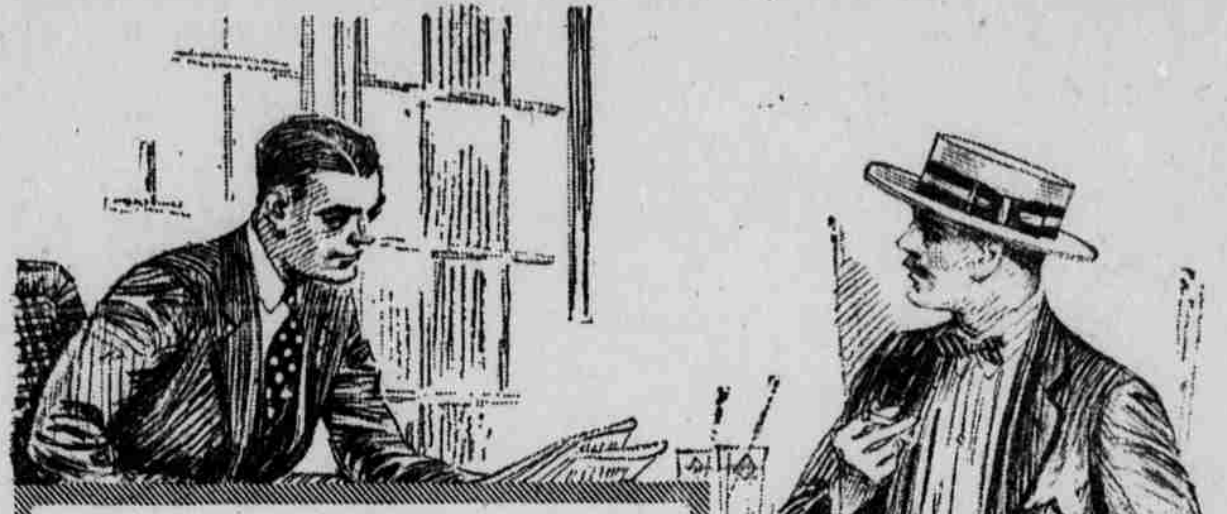
