**TIGERS AND SOONERS  
LOOM UP FOR VALLEY**

**Both Show Records From Dual Meets; Missouri Indoor Champion.**

Missouri and Oklahoma are looming up as the most dangerous entries in the Missouri Valley championship meet to be held on stadium field in Lincoln May 24. Both of these schools have won dual meets this year by substantial margins, and Missouri won the indoor Valley meet at Kansas City early in the season.

Kansas, considered a dangerous contender for Valley honors early in the season, has slumped somewhat since the defeat two weeks ago in the dual meet. The other schools in the Valley have not enough outstanding men in each event to hope for a crack at the championship but they do have individual stars in some of the events.

The stiffest opposition to Nebraska's attempts at a fourth straight Valley track championship will more than likely come from Missouri. The Missourians in former years have always had strong track teams, and at one time could say that they owned the Valley in the classic sport. Their victory in the indoor meet has set up high hopes of an outdoor championship this spring and Coach Schulte's Nebraska track men will have the fight of their lives a week and two days hence when they take the field bent on winning the fourth consecutive championship for Nebraska.

Entry lists received this week for the meet included twenty-two athletes from Kansas Aggies and twenty-eight from Missouri.
