Gibbs then smashed out a beautiful double that brought three runs in. Patton drew a pass and Collins doubled, after Bloodgood had fanned, bringing in two more. Collins came in with the final counter of the inning when the Sooner shortstop erred.

Reeves took over the hurling responsibility for the Sooners at this point and held the Huskers until the fifth. In that inning Bell got to first on an error and advanced to second when Janda was walked. Volz

received a bad cut under the eye in the sixth when a Sooner runner bumped into him. Hollingsworth took his place at first and Eckstrom relieved Collins in right field.

Mayes saved the Sooners from a shutout when he poled a home run in the seventh. It was a clean hit over the right field fence.

The game yesterday was the last of a two game series. Oklahoma took the contest Wednesday, winning in the ninth inning, the score being 4 to 5.
