### EXTENSION DIVISION OFFERS NEW COURSES

Educational Psychology Now Offered in Correspondence School Work.

Education 63x, a course in educational psychology, is a new subject being offered by the University Extension division in its correspondence school work. It is under the direction of F. E. Henzlick, professor of school administration, and O. H. Werner, associate professor of principles of education, both of the Teachers College.

The course shows how children learn and brings out a study of the physiological basis of all learning and an analysis of the original tendencies of human beings. Principles evolved will be applied more specifically to reading, spelling, and arithmetic in the case of elementary school teachers, and to English, social sciences, and mathematics for high school teachers.

The study throughout is elementary in nature and may be taken by students who have not had general psychology. There are twenty-four lessons given for three hours of University credit.
