But whatever the actual facts are, it is certain that there is no reason why student elections should not be interesting. There is no reasonunless students are satisfied with the present state of the University, and with administrative control of student affairs-why the W. S. G. A. members should not inaugurate a program of principles for the regulation of women's affairs. Then the candidates could take a public stand, and a real expression of student opinion could be reached.

It is true that the Association already has a set of rules for the government of women. If these rules are satisfactory to the women, there is no need of changing them. But if there is any possibility of a controversy over anything, then members should start it. Nebraska needs an election made interesting by controversy over real issues-a election with something besides the politics of Greek letter organizations to lend it spice. If it does not happen more than once every four or five years, it will do no harm to the students to force them to make a decision on some clean-cut issue.
