At some schools, and within the last ten years at Nebraska, the fraternities, after a great struggle, have adopted second-semester pledging. But at most schools it is the regents, trustees, or faculty who must take the lead. When the system is once in force it usually is satisfactory to all concerned.

At the University of Kansas a Home Economics. campaign is being carried on to adopt delayed pledging. The stimulus that started this campaign may have been an incident, caused by hurried rushing, that occurred recently. A rushee, preceded by a highly laudatory telegram from another chapter, was received with enthusiasm by one of the oldest fraternities on the K. U. campus. He was pledged. Later it developed that the young man had entered the school on forced credits, had sent the telegram himself, and that while he came of a good family that he had been charged with a particularly helnous crime. Only by accident was this discovered, and the man's pledge broken. The fraternity has not yet recovered from the loss of prestige suffered from this incident. 
