10, 35, 40, 50, 38, 30 and 30 yards. Total yardage of punts 483. Average distance of punts 35 1-4 yards. Nebraska punted 12 times for distances of 30, 30, 50, 50, 42, 45, 35, 40, 28, 30, 30, and 30 yards. Total yardage on punts 470. Average of punts 39 1-16 yards. One Nebraska punt was blocked.

Punts returned—Drake returned three Nebraska punts for distances of 8, 10, and 3 yards. Nebraska run back of the Drake punts for distances of 10, 5, 8, 20 and 14 yards. Total distance of punts returned—Drake 21; Nebraska 55.

Penalties—Drake was penalized five times, five yards each time, for a total of 25 yards. Nebraska was penalized twice for five yards each time.

Forward passes—Drake attempted no passes. Nebraska attempted six passes, of which one was successful for a gain of 23 yards.

Throw for losses—Nebraska 10 yards; Drake 9 yards.

Fumbles—Drake fumbled eight times, Nebraska fumbled fourteen times. Drake recovered fourteen fumbles; Nebraska recovered eight fumbles.

Dr. S. J. Barnett, of Pasadena, Cal., will lecture on "Magnetization by Rotation," in the lecture room of the Brace Laboratory of Physics, Tuesday, November 10, at 4 o'clock. Dr. Barnett was formerly professor of physics at Tulane University and Ohio State University, but has been connected for several years with the magnetic survey laboratory of the Carnegie Institution of Washington. He is the author of a treatise on electricity and magnetism and of numerous papers presenting results of research work in this field.

## ALUMNI VISIT DEAN FERGUSON

Discuss Use of Transmission Line in Electrical Laboratories

A group of visitors at Dean Ferguson's office included two Nebraska alumni, M. B. Long, B. S., '17, and P. M. McCullough, electrical, '17, and Mr. Gray. While here the visitors discussed what they could do to help the College of Engineering to put into more advantageous use the artificial 200-mile transmission line that the Northwestern Bell companies have placed in the University electrical laboratories.

The apparatus is valuable from the point of view of cost as well as from the standpoint of the manifold possibilities for experimentation in the laboratories. It is an oscillation current generator which will generate alternating currents of all frequencies from 100 to 50,000 oscillations per second. To give an idea of the tremendous possibilities which this generator presents, one needs to only compare it with the speech range on the telephone circuit. The range on that is from 20 or 300 to 1200 oscillations per second and the whole of it will be included in the range of the new generator besides including all frequencies up to 50,000 oscillations per second.

Mr. Long is an educational director for the Bell Telephone laboratories, Inc., in New York City. Mr. McCullough is a division plant engineer of the Northwestern Bell Telephone company of Omaha. Mr. Gray also holds a position with this company.

### Publish Results of Experiment

A report of experimental work as carried out with a group of chemistry students at the University of Nebraska by Dr. Winnifred F. Hyde, professor of psychology, was published recently in the Journal of Applied Psychology.

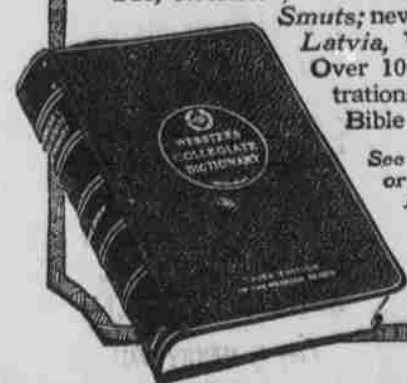
