BARBOUR FINISHES PANEL

Study for Decoration of Morrill Hall Lectures Nebraska Fossils

Prof. E. H. Barbour of the department of geology, curator of the University museum, finished last week the first study of the eighth panel for the decorations of the New Morrill hall. At the extreme right of the fifty-foot panel will be giant fossil hogs. In the center are shown a group of Moropus (sickle-foot). Of two existent fossil remains of this animal one is in the Nebraska museum. Slightly to the left of the center will be a group of Diceratherium, little rhinoceroses. At the extreme left are shown two little four-horned antelopes. A giant turtle from the Bad Lands fossil remains is in the foreground. All the fossils depicted were found in Nebraska. The study will be on exhibit Sunday, February 28.
