**Walter Wilson Discusses Profession At Smoker of Student Society**

Mr. Walter F. Wilson, of the firm of Davis and Wilson, architects, of Lincoln, addressed a smoker held by Ionique Society Thursday evening on "The Profession of Architecture."

Mr. Wilson stated in his address that "Although the profession of architecture, and architecture itself, is considered one of the fine arts, the real efficiency of an architectural organization depends on a considerable knowledge of business and business methods. Architects of this day should be fully capable of carrying through all of the special design problems of any certain commission, together with the structural, mechanical, and business relation problems which must necessarily enter into the work of completing any single commission. Although it may seem a terrific hardship, it would seem best that the architectural course should be taken merely as a post-graduate course after the Bachelor of Arts degree had been reached."
