the movement by political observers, although they admit at the same time that the element behind it is less powerful than several years ago. The main argument of the American Legion posts and leaders of other organizations in favor of the drill have been from a consideration of national defense. To University authorities and professors, it is more a question of whether or not the University is to have jurisdiction over school matters. The fear is expressed that if the question of drill as a required subject is settled by popular vote it would establish a precedent for similar interference in other subjects. Physical education, now a required subject for women students might arouse some day a similar referendum, as might required English, or modern language in the college of arts and sciences.

Find Mammoth Skull In Irrigation Ditch

(University News Service) A mammoth skull weighing 1,000 pounds with tusks 9 feet long and over 30 inches in circumference was dug out of the banks of a government irrigation ditch near Lingle, Wyoming, just across the state border, last week by Prof. E. H. Barbour, curator of the museum, and Phil Orr, special student in paleontology. The bones have been crated and are ready for shipment to Lincoln. The body of the mammoth will be dug out next fall when the ditch is dry again. The specimen is of the Elephas Columbi type of which the University museum has several. It will be put into the Hall of Elephants of the new Morrill Hall.

Get Specimen Soils From Fairbury Well

(University News Service.) The first shipment of specimen soils from the deep well being drilled near Fairbury was received recently by the conservation and survey division. W. H. Ingersoll, temporarily connected with the division, is keeping a log of the drilling. Another shipment was received from Chadron where a deeper well is being drilled. No public information concerning the wells can be given out by the division until the work is entirely completed. A state law requires a report from all deep-well drilling, so that the conservation and survey division may have the information in its studies of the state.
