## Military Department Interested in Compet

in 1882. Although Lieut. Tounley was a capable man in the navy his knowledge of military drill was decidedly limited and the cadets were drilling to the terms of port and starboard before he learned the use of army commands. During the time of Lieutenant Tounley a rifle range was established in the northern part of the town.

Lieut. Dudley was re-appointed in 1884 and in his last four years the interest in military science increased greatly. His help was instrumental in securing funds for the building of Grant Memorial Hall and the building was completed before his term at Nebraska ended. Lieut. Dudley was also the founder of the College of Engineering at the university.

Lieut. T. W. Griffith of the United States Infantry succeeded Lieut. Dudley. His term of service lasted for the full four years.

Major General John J. Pershing, at that time a lieutenant, followed in the list of commanders. A writer of that time that Pershing was here affirmed that the famous officer was the strictest disciplinarians and the men were really taught the fundamentals of military science and tactics.

It is of interest to note that in the National Competitive drills held in Omaha in 1892, the Nebraska battalion won the prize offered to the best-drilling battalion.

During the Spanish-American war a company of student soldiers went into active duty with the university commandant, Lieut. John J. Stotsenburg, who was killed in action in the Philippines. Absence of a commandant did not stop military work in the university. Cadet Major Weeks and Brown taking charge.

The giving of credit for work in the military department was started and interest again revived. In 1905 to 1909 Captain J. B. Workizer improved the equipment a great deal.

The annual "comp" was started in 1905 and Company E won first place. Cadet Captain Bowly was the officer in charge of the winning company.

In 1917 the Students Army Training Corps took the place of the Reserve Officers Training Corps. After the war the R. O. T. C. was re-organized with an artillery unit included in the department. Suitable

quarters for the necessary equipment were not available and the unit was withdrawn in the spring of 1920.

In 1920 the military department moved from their quarters in Grant Memorial Hall to Nebraska Hall, where they have remained. The present drill field east of Nebraska Hall was filled and leveled to be used for a drill field.

Major Sidney Erickson became commandant in 1922 and his services extended until last spring, when he was succeeded by Colonel F. F. Jewett, the present commandant.

In 1922 blue uniforms were issued to the commissioned officers. The distinction between the uniforms of the advanced students and those of the ones in the basic course seemed to stimulate interest in the advanced course. During Major Erickson's term the number of students in the advanced course was more than double that of previous years.

At the present time Nebraska has one of the largest, if not the largest military units in the nation. The men who go together to make the unit the large one that it is are looking towards the day of inspection with a determination to keep the distinguished rating in the university.
