HUSKER SQUADS TRAIN FOR MEET

Track and Field Men Getting In Shape For Missouri Valley Events

WILL EASE PACE SOON

Coach Schulte is getting his track and field squad in shape for the big classic of the year, the annual Missouri Valley track and field meet here Friday and Saturday.

Friday evening he sent Dailey and Davenport through a 440. Dailey stepped it in 51.4 seconds with Davenport's time slightly over 52. Roberts and Lewis went through a three-fourths mile for a little over distance work in 3 minutes 20 seconds. Zimmerman, working on pace, also went three-fourths mile, taking it in 3 minutes 38 seconds.

Saturday morning, Lewis paced the Freshmen half-milers and was running better than he has for several weeks. It looks now as if he would be back in shape for the Valley meet.

It is still uncertain what shape Bill Hein will be in for the Valley meet. His leg is slowly improving, but Coach Schulte doesn't expect to know until the day of the meet whether he will run. Otherwise, the team is in fine physical condition.

The coming week will see a gradual easing off to put the team on edge for the fight assured them in every event.

TENNIS TEAM WINS AND LOSES ON TRIP

Easily Beat Ames Friday; Bow Down Saturday in Second Match After Hard Fight

The tennis team won at Ames on Friday, giving their opponents only one game, but lost every game at Grinnell Saturday. At Ames they won four out of the five matches that were played. The singles at Ames, Saturday, were played sluggishly. The doubles were by far the hardest to win.

Schildneck was the star at Ames. His driving was the most spectacular on the court this season. Elliott also played a very good game and was considered a star.

The matches at Grinnell were played with much more speed and, even though Nebraska was forced to submit to the Grinnell racket men, they forced duces from their opponents in every set of singles.

William Gregg Presents Gift, Including Mezzotint, to Arts School

William C. Gregg, '84, Hackensack, New Jersey, has given five original etchings and one mezzotint to the School of Fine Arts. The names of the etchings are: "The Porch of St. Magnus," by Hedley Fitton; "London Bridge," "The Chantry of Cardinal Beaufort, Winchester Cathedral," by Hedley Fitton; "The Angler's Paradise," by Norman Wilkinson; "Luck, the Trapper," by H. Harvey; "Crowthorne, Worcestershire," by Albany Howarth.

The name of the mezzotint is "The Comet," by R. C. Peters. Gregg purchased these etchings in England and shipped them directly to the School. Several other paintings have been presented to the School by Gregg; one oil, "Venice, from the Canal of San Giorgio" by E. W. Cooke, and an etching "Lace" by John Taylor Arms.

floor will accommodate 1,500 couples. Third, to house all University assemblies, and to serve as a convention hall for the large state-wide meetings.

The great arena will accommodate numerous special features in the newly-inaugurated alumni-student event, May 28, when an indoor Carnival will be held there. The corridor under the balconies, which is three blocks long, will form a splendid parkway for the "Avenue of

Years", a feature of the general reunion Saturday morning, May 29. The main floor is large enough for cadet company exhibition drill, and part of the traditional "compet" will be staged there. A whole battalion of cadets was accommodated comfortably a week ago during the annual Blue Star government inspection of the Nebraska R. O. T. C. unit.

The stage when completed will be used for the final individual competitive drill which is planned will part of the Carnival of Fun.

The full possibilities of the new Field House will be only partially realized in this preliminary use of the structure. It is expected to become more and more an indispensable unit in campus life in the future.

The financing of this latest and much-needed addition to the campus has been taken care of, in the main, by the Athletic Association from its cash reserves and by issuance of bonds.
