**High School Debate Question Announced**

The question to be debated this year by Nebraska high schools was announced Thursday by C. K. Morse, superintendent of the School of Agriculture at Curtis, secretary-treasurer of the Nebraska High School Debating League. It is "Resolved: That Congress shall adopt in substance the principles of the Curtis-Reed bill, constitutionality waived." The Curtis-Reed bill provides for the establishment of a federal department of education with a secretary in the cabinet. The University Extension division is preparing a bibliography and abstract on the question which will be ready for distribution late this week.

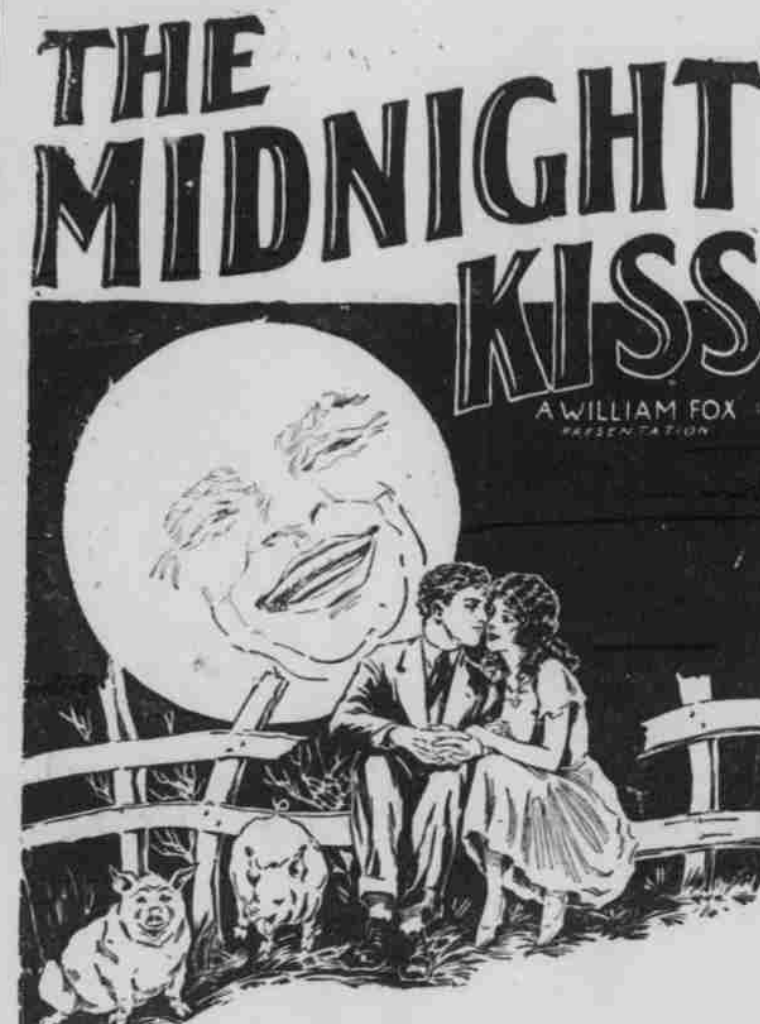

yards through the line. Nebraska was penalized five yards for being off side. Lindell made it first and ten when he tore through tackle for 11 yards. Morrison went in for Grow on the Nebraska line. W. Smith replaced Simpson in the Drake line-up. Marrow made three yards through the line. A pass Lindell to Mielen was incomplete. Nebraska was penalized fifteen yards for holding.

A pass Lindell to Sprague was good for 17 yards. Lindell failed to gain through the line. Beebe replaced Sutherland and Meyers went in for Dustin in the Drake backfield. Lindell yanked out of bounds on the Drake 42-yard line.  
Fry hit the line for one yard. Fry made

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five yards at right tackle. Shaner replaced Sprague at end for Nebraska. F. Anderson took Cook's place in the Drake backfield. Fry plunged for one yard.  
J. Shearer and Delmege were now playing ends for Drake, Robertson being taken out. Burns replaced R. Mandery and Durisch went into the Nebraska line up for Kandel.  
Lucas blocked Meyers punt and recovered the ball for Nebraska on Drake's 28-yard line. Marrow plunged through the Drake line for 29 yards, but fumbled and Beebe recovered for Drake. Anderson was hurt in the play and was replaced by Everett.  
Meyers pass was incomplete. Molsen replaced Lucas; Gates went in for Zover; Gehrich replaced Beck; Stephens replaced Marrow and Du Tesu went in for Lindell all in the Nebraska line up. Ewart replaced Smith in the Drake line-up.  
Meyers passed to Everett for five yards. Another pass, Everett to Fry was good for 8 yards and a first down. Meyers passed to Everett for 8 yards as the game ended.
