

Ames Men See Their Brothers In Grid Battle

Ames, Iowa, Dec. 1.—Special: Not the least interested of the 110,000 spectators gathered for the Army-Navy grid classic in Chicago Saturday were two Iowa State men, brothers of main cogs in the Army and Navy football machinery.

Lieut. Herbert M. Jones of the Military Department of Iowa State, brother of "Biff" Jones, head coach of the Army eleven, and Jim Hardwick of the Iowa State college Y. M. C. A. brother of the star Navy end that grabbed the long forward pass that made possible the first Middle counter, are the two men who were drawn to the service game for other reasons than to see two great teams battle.

In talking to his brother after the game Lieutenant Jones asked the Army mentor concerning "Spike" Nave, Cyclone end of two years ago who received an appointment to West Point. Nave has been shifted to quarterback by the army coach, and is considered one of the candidates for the quarterback position at the army school.

The fact that he entered West Point during the war was largely responsible for Lieutenant Jones of Iowa State not following in the footsteps of his brother, the present Army coach. Jim Hardwick of the Y. M. C. A. at Iowa State, like his famous brother, the crack Navy right end, played an end position in his college days at Virginia and Vanderbilt. Hardwick is one of the freshman grid coaches at Iowa State.

Discovery of Limestone Formation In South Dakota Opens Oil Prospects

Vermillion, S. D., Nov. 30.—Discovery of a limestone formation at 3027 feet in the Standing Butte well near Fort Pierre has opened the prospect of a new oil horizon all over western South Dakota, Professor E. P. Rothrock, acting state geologist and head of the department of geology at the University of South Dakota, stated today upon receiving data which corroborated the theory that the formation was a Paleozoic rock. "The well has disclosed a hitherto unknown geologic fact," Mr. Rothrock said, "which is of utmost importance in prospecting the whole west river country."

The Dakota sandstone, which lies directly below the Pierre shale, the chief source rock for oil in the Cretaceous deposits, has been generally regarded as the only horizon for oil in South Dakota. A few wells have been sunk in this sandstone but they have usually encountered a flow of artesian water instead of oil. Geologists have long desired to know what lay beneath the Dakota sandstone.

It appeared, from the meager information available, that the Pale-

zoic limestone thinned out toward the east from the Black Hills and it was feared that it was not present under the area where oil structures have been found. The limestone, known as the Pahasapa, appears in the Black Hills uplift where it is very thick. The Standing Butte well has gone into the formation 140 feet but it is not known how much deeper it will be.

Paleozoic Rocks Supply Oil
Paleozoic rocks, similar to this limestone, supplies the oil for the heaviest producing fields in the United States, according to Professor Rothrock. The Appalachian field in the east, and the mid-continent field in Oklahoma and Texas are Paleozoic. It is a characteristic of wells drilled through limestone that they come in as gushers.

The discovery of this limestone formation emphasizes the importance of drilling all tests in the west river area down below the Dakota sandstone, as suggested by W. L. Russell, geologist for the state Geological and Natural History survey, in several of his published reports.

Vocational Education Is Subject of Lecture Given by C. C. Minter

"Opportunities in Vocational Education" was the subject of a paper by H. E. Bradford, professor of vocational education and principal of the School of Agriculture of the University of Nebraska, which was read by Prof. C. C. Minter over KFAB from the university broadcasting studio Wednesday evening.

Professor Bradford's paper explained the work of men and women engaged in vocational educational work. He declared that there are many fine openings for young people wishing to go into that field.

"We are now entering upon a period of extensive development in vocational education," he said. "The nation is awakening to its responsibility for training the youth for productive, skillful work. As the work grows, more executive positions will need to be filled. The teachers who qualify early will be in line for the best openings."

Iowa State To Have Boxing Tournament

On Dec. 4, 6, and 8 Iowa State will hold an all-college boxing meet to get a line on the promising Tunneys for the coming ring season. Gold and silver medals will be given the winners and runners-up in each division. Last year the all-college boxing meet attracted more attention than any other pre-season tourney put on by the athletic department.
