Squad May Meet Kansas City Hilliards in Pre-season Practice Game

GOOD MATERIAL EVIDENT

A lengthy scrimmage was scheduled for Coach Charley Black's basketballers yesterday afternoon in which four teams were used preparatory to the selection of the squad which will probably go to Kansas City during the holiday vacation for a practice game with the Hilliard quintet. The regular season will be opened with a game on the home court January 8 with the Kansas Aggies.

The early scrimmages indicate that enough material of regular Varsity calibre has been reporting so that two teams of nearly equal strength will be available during the season. The first squad selected for yesterday's workout had Captain Smaha and Othmer at the forward positions, Elliot at center, and Gerelick and Anderson as the guards. This group lost by a narrow margin to a second squad composed of Klepser and Brown at forwards, Page at center, and Holm and Krah at guards.

Brown Leads Scoring
Sinking five shots during the practice, Jug Brown seemed to be getting the best results in the attempts at scoring. Captain Smaha was second with four baskets. Members of both quintets were hitting the basket and playing the floor in good shape for early season practices.

In the second division, Armstrong and Roth, Paulsen, Gohde and Morrison scrimmaged against Lindell and Nimmo, Holmes, Horney and Sprague.

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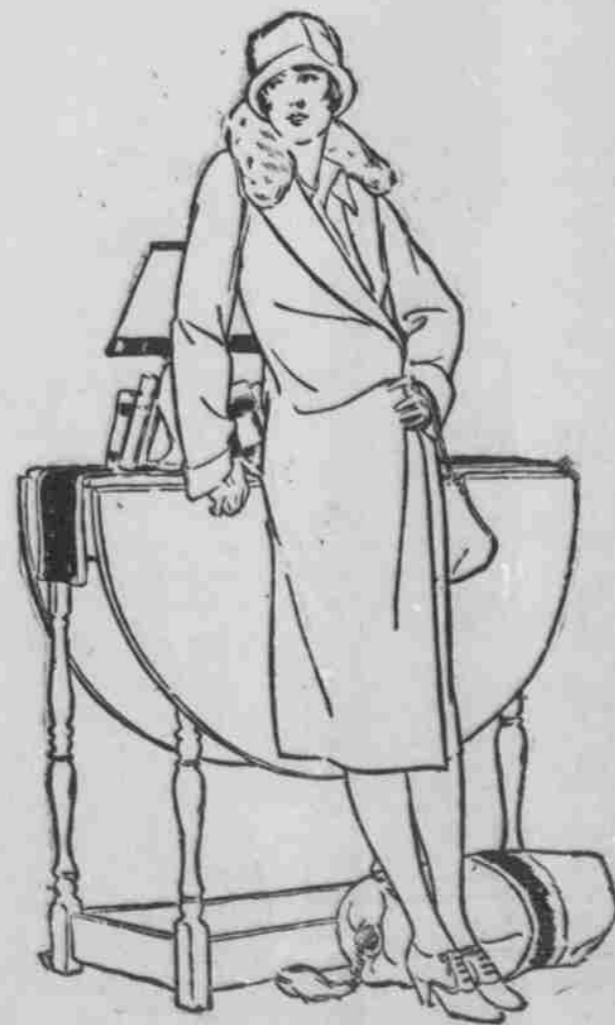
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
