

COUNCIL PASSES ON Y.M. PETITION

The matter decided that the name was a minor consideration and that the type of show was the major concern.

The petition as it will be presented to the faculty committee is as follows:
To the Student Council and the Faculty Committee on Student Organizations.

The University Y. M. C. A. acting through its University Night committee desires to sponsor again University Night which was abolished last year, and does hereby petition the Student Council and the faculty committee on student organizations to reinstate University Night, not as presented last year but under plans which are outlined below.

Skits Come From Groups
Skits are to be submitted by fraternities and sororities or any other organized, responsible group. And each organization, at the time of submission of its skit, must submit to the committee in charge an exact manuscript of its skit as it is to be presented. A copy of each manuscript will be submitted to the dean of student affairs for his approval. Production of any skit selected by the committee will rest solely upon the organization submitting that skit.

Selection of skits will be left to the University Night committee, which will consist of not more than four members appointed by the president of the University Y. M. C. A., and two members, who must be girls, to be selected by the committee. All members of this committee

must be members of the university in good standing and every effort will be made to select only persons who will sincerely attempt to secure for the university clean and wholesome entertainment.

Only persons who can meet the requirements of the University Night committee will be eligible to participate in this program.

All participants in this program will be directly responsible to the University Night committee for reciting any lines or indulging in any actions which have not been approved beforehand. Any person violating the rules of this committee which are herein set forth will have charges preferred by the committee against them to the Student Council which, sitting as a jury, will hear these charges and make recommendations to the dean of student affairs for punishment of these individuals.

The University Night committee will use all possible means to insure that nothing of an undesirable nature may enter into the program. And this committee will assume all responsibility for every word and action which enters into this program provided that the Student Council will decide the merit of any charges that may be preferred to it against any participant and make recommendations to the dean of student affairs for punishment of these individuals.

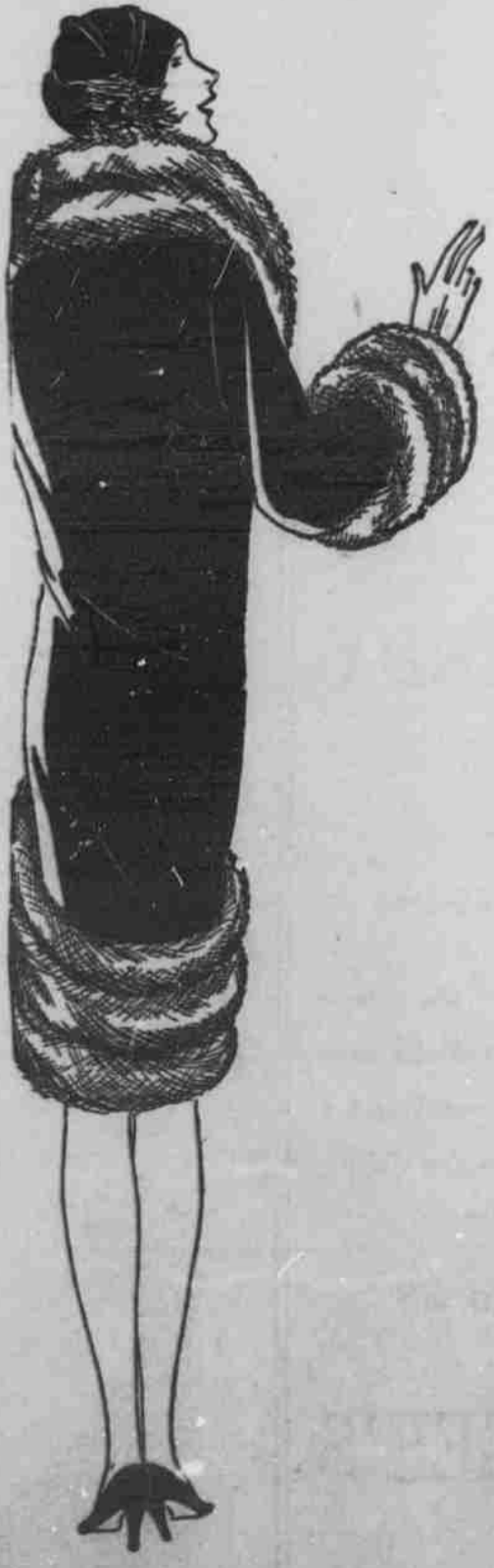
