

## MANY SCHOOLS ENTER TOURNEY

High School Wrestlers Weigh In on Coliseum Scales Friday Morning

Nebraska's first state high school wrestling tournament will start Friday at the Coliseum, according to wrestling coach John Kellogg who is in charge of the meet. Several entries have been received from out-state schools and by the time pairings and classifications are made, Kellogg expects more teams to enter.

Schools whose entries have already been received are Lincoln, Aggies, McCook, Spencer, Milford, Cambridge and Teachers' high. All of these will enter full teams, with the exception of Cambridge.

Contestants will weigh in at the Coliseum at 9:30 o'clock Friday morning. The meet will be run off rapidly, final matches in all weights being held Saturday afternoon. Coaches and their wrestlers will be guests Saturday night at the Missouri-Nebraska wrestling meet.

Scoring for last week of members of the Nebraska Rifle team was well balanced. The individual scores are as follows:

## HUSKERS POINT FOR OKLAHOMA

Two Wins in Southern Tussles Would Place Nebraska in Upper Division

Stowing the Grinnell game away in the victory column, the Huskers will devote the remaining practice sessions this week in an effort to get in the best shape possible for the coming contests on Oklahoma soil. The Huskers invade Norman Saturday night and Stillwater the following Monday to end the season for Oklahoma and Oklahoma Aggies as well as for themselves.

In winning the Tuesday game from the Pioneers, the Nebraska hoopers broke a string of three successive victories which were pulled out by the Iowa quintet over Washington, Missouri, and the Kansas Aggies. Although the Grinnell team displayed a listless example of the indoor game, the Huskers showed to advantage mostly through the efforts of Tom Elliott and "Jug" Brown, who played their last home game, and Harvey Grace, flashy sophomore forward.

**Ten Men Will Go South**  
 Ten players will probably be included in the squad which will accompany Coach Charley Black and Student Manager Carleton Freas on the trip to the southland. Tom Elliott, Glen Munn, "Jug" Brown, "Dutch" Witte, "Harv" Grace, Elmer Holm, Bob Krall, Kenny Othmer, Carl Olson, and Adolph Lewandowski are the members who will probably get the call to represent Nebraska on the Oklahoma courts.

By winning the Grinnell game Tuesday evening, the Huskers scored their most decisive win of the present season and more than doubled the score in winning 35 to 16. All the team members emerged in good condition from the tussle and went through a snappy workout at the Coliseum Wednesday afternoon.

**Nebraska Is Seventh**  
 Tuesday's victory puts the Nebraska cagers a few points behind the Washington Bears who also came out victors in a Monday night game with Iowa State. The Bear quintet still clings to sixth place while the Huskers are in seventh place with seven games won and nine lost. The Husker percentage is now .438. If

the Nebraskans break even in their southern games, their percentage will be .444 for the 1928 season. Both games in the victory column would put the Huskers in the first division with nine games won and as many lost for a percentage of .500.

Saturday evening's starting lineup will not be named until the squad arrives at Norman and goes through preliminary practice drill. Coach Charley Black will probably start his strongest lineup, with Brown and Grace at the forward positions, Munn at center to oppose the lanky Holt, and Holm and Krall at the guard berths. In the last meeting between the Oklahoma quintet and Nebraska, Vic Holt, who leads the Valley individual scorers, was effectively covered and held to 6 markers.

According to Nebraska fans, the present basketball season will be a great success if the Huskers can pull out a victory over the hitherto unbeaten Oklahoma five. With a string of 17 straight wins to their credit, the Sooners will attempt to grab the big end of the score and finish the 1928 basketball season undefeated and easily the winners of the Missouri Valley Conference championship.

Ab Wright, the Oklahoma Aggie flash nearly overtook Vic Holt in the individual scoring honors in the Kansas-Oak Aggie game last Monday. Wright started out the season leading the list of individual scorers and may head the tall Sooner center before the season is over.

Wright is in third place and has three games to go while Holt is leading and but one game left to swell his total. That game is with Nebraska on the Norman court. Wright has 193 points on record now and an average of 13 points to a game.

Yunker, the fast traveling Mizzo forward may catch Holt on the basis of averages. The Tiger star has 179 points and an average of 12 points per game and three more games to increase his total.

Coach Schulte's cinder path artists will meet the Kansas State track team in an indoor meet at the Stadium Saturday afternoon. This will give both teams some advance practice for the Missouri Valley meet at Des Moines next week.

The Oklahoma Sooners have a record that has not been equaled by any other basketball team in the Missouri Valley, that of winning 17 straight games in the conference. The Allen crew from Lawrence nearly equaled the Sooner record some years back when they won a string of 15 games in the Valley.

The Sooners also have another unique record, and that of winning the last Missouri basketball championship in which the ten present schools participated. The Missouri Valley is no more as far as the Big Six is concerned and to Coach McDermott and his wonder team from Norman goes the honor of capturing the final conference title.

The high school basketball tournament to be held in the Coliseum next week will in all probability be the largest basket tourney of its kind in the country. Herb Gish, who has charge of the tournament expects 250 teams to enter. Last year there was close to 260 teams and state high school officials made a ruling that a high school quintet had to win fifty percent of its games to enter the state meet. Regardless of this new ruling, it appears that the entry list will be almost as large as last season.

## OMAHA PROFESSOR IS HUNG IN EFFIGY

Undergraduate Sentiment Is Stirred Up With Dismissal of Two Prominent Athletes

An effigy of Dr. Karl F. Wettstone, of the Omaha University faculty, was hung on the Athletic field flag pole after midnight Tuesday by students at Omaha U. Dr. Wettstone expresses his intention to "continue to ignore them".

Undergraduate sentiment was aroused by the dismissal of two students from the school. Dr. Wettstone believes that it is only a handful of radicals who are taking such actions, and that the majority of the leaders of the student body seem to be behind him.

The students whose dismissal has stirred up Omaha U in such a manner are Merle Temple and Fred Miller. These men were elected to the athletic board, but Dr. Wettstone ordered the election set aside. As a result of protests, the two were dismissed from Omaha University. Both were athletes, Temple being quarterback of the football team.

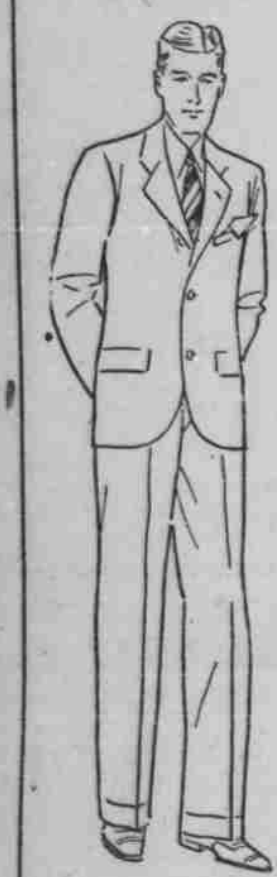
