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Plans are already under way which

will include a dormitory for the girls at the Curtis School of Agriculture, new housing at the agricultural college campus for the nursery school of the department of home economics, and the remodeling of the law

building which will be done this summer.
The chancellor also outlined the requests that will be made to the legislature in the coming session. He stated that a request for adequate support of the teaching department would be made. More instructors are needed so that smaller classes, especially in the freshman classes, may be possible. A grant for higher wage scale for those in key positions will be asked.

The College of Medicine at Omaha is also in need of further support. He named the various additions that should be made to meet the ever increasing registration of the university.

Ramsey Gives Talk

Addresses were also given by W. C. Ramsey of Omaha and Ross King member of the honor class of 1908. Mr. King in his address emphasized the part that the layman must play in the career of the university student. He said the problems confronting those in charge of the administration of the university has increased a hundred-fold in the twenty years since the graduation of his class. "Owing to this complexity," he said, "there is a disposition on the part of some of our professional educators to resent the interference of the laymen." Mr. King protested that the lay views are quite as valuable as those of the specialist in education.

Students May Get Tickets
All non-graduating students who desire to attend the exercises may obtain tickets at the office of the registrar also, while students from the College of Medicine will receive them from Dean J. J. Keegan or Miss Charlotte Burgess of the school of nursing. Tickets will admit the

holder to a special reserved section in the coliseum while other sections will be open to the general public. Graduates are required to pay their diploma fees to the Finance Secretary by Tuesday, May 29 and no degrees will be conferred unless these fees have been paid which can be shown by presentation of the fee card. The fees are as follows: Diploma, for graduate college, ten dollars; from all other colleges, five dollars; if degree be taken "in absentia," ten dollars additional; University Teachers certificate, two dollars; Physical Education, Journalism, Vocational Agriculture and Home Economics certificates, one dollar.

Candidates for master's and doctor's degrees are required to submit the usual form with all signatures

stating that requirements have been met, thesis accepted, and deposit of usual number of copies in the library and other necessary material to the office of the registrar by 12 o'clock noon, Tuesday, May 29.

The University of Nebraska has offered courses in botany at Estes Park as a part of the summer session for two years. Dr. Raymond J. Pool conducts the courses.

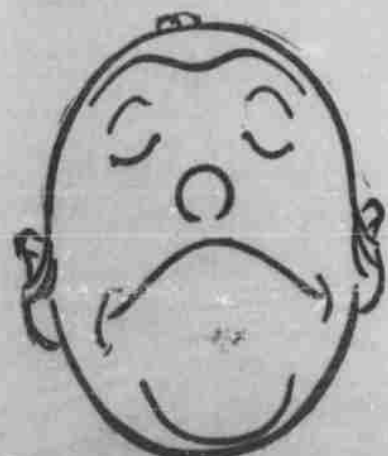
