Town Geology Well Worth Study, Declares Collins in Radio Talk

"Town Geology" as found in the wall formations of some of Lincoln's newer business buildings is well worth the study and attention of everyone, F. G. Collins, assistant curator of the museum, declared in his weekly radio talk at the university studio, Thursday morning.

"I dare say others as well as myself," said Collins, "have noticed a remarkably beautiful wall that has just been revealed on the streets of Lincoln by the removal of the builders' boarding. It refers to the spaces between the shop fronts in the new Stuart building at the southeast corner of Thirteenth and P streets. Nearly two score spaces have been faced with polished slabs of Minnesota gneiss and it would be difficult to imagine a more beautiful and more decorative wall."

Collins quoted from Shakespeare's comedy "As You Like It" the passage wherein one of the characters speaks of finding "semons in stones" and said that he felt certain that had Shakespeare seen polished Minnesota gneiss he would have been tempted to say, instead, "fairly tales in stones."

Fairy Dells Mirrored "Many a health-minded child, and grown-up, too," pointed out the curator, "will be reminded as they gaze at these narrow walls between the shops of mystical, weird, fantastic things. Go up and see for yourselves. I am sure you will be peeping those stone slabs. The high polish allows you to look into the stone, and you will see the giant's castles, the fairy dells and grottoes, the cities of enchantment,

the rivers of flames and fiery furnaces, with ogres, giants, gnomes, elfs and fairies, witches and dragons, talking trees and everything that is fabulous."

Rock gneiss, Collins went on to explain, is composed of the same mineral material as granite, but its parts are arranged or grouped together in a manner unlike that of the granite. The Buick building at 15th and P streets and the Sharp building at 13th and N streets are examples, he said, of buildings having granite walls.

In these two buildings may be seen how the quartz, felspar, and mica, of which both granite and gneiss are made up, are put together more or less "higgledy-piggledy" in granite. In gneiss, as seen in the Stuart building, these minerals have been drawn out into all sorts of lines and contortions.

Church Built of Gneiss

"In Minnesota," stated Collins, "are great masses of gneiss, and at Morton, near Redwood Falls, is a beautiful church built of it. It is a little Mission church on an Indian reservation, and it is built of rough, untruncated chunks of gneiss. I remember how beautiful I thought that church, but these polished slabs at Thirteenth and P streets are much more beautiful."

"I hope," finished Collins, "what I have said will induce you to go and take a good look at it, and if you would like to know more about the stone come into Merrill hall and see a piece of it in your hand as we have many specimens of granite and gneiss, and you would, I am sure, be interested to compare them in hand specimens or under a microscope."
